History

The Great Chicago Fire was a conflagration that burned from Sunday, October 8, to early Tuesday, October 10, 1871, killing hundreds and destroying about 4 square miles (10 km²) in Chicago. There were a few buildings that did not get destroyed. The Chicago Water Tower was one of them. The principal reason; the Water Tower was one of the few buildings that was made out of limestone rather than wood. Though the fire was one of the largest U.S. disasters of the 19th century, the rebuilding began almost immediately and spurred Chicago's development into one of the most populous and economically important American cities.

The World's Columbian Exposition (World's Fair) opened in May and ran through October 30, 1893. Forty-six nations participated in the fair. The first world's fair included the construction of national pavilions, constructing exhibits and the naming of national "delegates" (i.e., Haiti selected Frederick Douglass to be its delegate). The Exposition drew nearly 26 million visitors. It left a remembered vision that inspired the Emerald City of L. Frank Baum's Land of Oz and Walt Disney's theme parks. Disney's father Elias had been a construction worker on some of the buildings at the fair.
